It may have even saved my life, which is something I realized after the fact. Perhaps If I had met a poet when I was a kid, I might have come to this much earlier.

So I will drive across the state for poetry, just as I will give four years of my life to the PSM. Just as I will give thirty years to Friends of Poetry. I will read and comment and teach because I believe that poetry is that important to people's lives.

And I won't even add, especially at times like these. Poetry has mattered to a lot of people for a long time, long before the current pandemic, mattered enough that some of them formed organizations—like The Poetry Society of Michigan—to share poetry's importance with others. To pay it forward (so to speak).

What about you? Can you give some of your time to sharing poetry's importance with others? As I come to the end of two terms as your president, I ask you to consider how important poetry is to you, and what you can do to pay it forward. Perhaps become more involved? Take on one of the leadership roles up for election in October? Believe me, it's gratifying and fun (even when it's not haha fun).

We will meet in-person (!) in Lowell in October, Delta-variant willing. [More about the meeting can be found on page 3] If we have to Zoom, we will, of course.. We will do whatever we need to do to keep us going. But after that? What will you do? Consider stepping up. Be the one who says, "I will. I will make this poetry community continue."





One Poet's Pandemic Ponderings

Ever notice how serious fears or concerns never really vacate our thoughts despite our best efforts? You know, things like an injury to your child, a deteriorating marriage, the unexpected terminal illness of a loved one, uncertainties of job or income, or this thing called a pandemic?

They seem to persist like an elephant in the room or a shadow in the corner, even when you're talking about a subject entirely unrelated. When there's a significant pause in the committee discussion or your neighborly visit stalls, there they are again, popping up to remind us—those little anxieties that are a part of everyone's lives, annoying concerns that are never really alleviated or eliminated.

And because you are, as a result, more sensitive to things in general, such anxieties can tend to drag even more things into thoughtful awareness, more often than you might otherwise think. For example: life, happiness, success, long-standing principles, prejudices, etc. At least that's my experience, especially in terms of the various pandemic ponderings that have stumbled unexpectantly into my mind. I'm never certain just what the moment's anxiety is going to be until it comes knocking on my cerebral door. I'm referring to things like the following:

No matter what age we might be at, life is like playing a violin in public and learning the instrument as we go along, making mistakes and correcting them. Yet, if you've never learned to play any instrument, like me, you might think life just a series of mistakes. So be it. I believe that a life spent making mistakes is not only honorable but more useful than a life spent fearing to do anything challenging because one might make mistakes.

(Allow me to add here that, if I had my life to live over, I'd still not learn an instrument. Instead, I'd live over a delicatessen. Hey, what can I tell ya, I love deli food!)

One thing I have learned and truly believe is that you have to live life to love life, and you have to love life to live life. It's not a vicious circle but a circle of seeking, reaching and achieving. It is a circle of finding and fulfilling. Meaningful reality is much more than a collective hunch.

Principles are paramount in life as we attempt to navigate the landscape of hypocrisy with some semblance of character. But considering recent events, it seems to me that many people find it easier to fight for one's principles than to live up to them. Just look at the menagerie of protests that are populated by too many without the slightest concern for human decency in the behavior they exhibit. Talk abut anxiety! The political class appears to believe that the most useful thing about a principle is that it always can be sacrificed for expediency.

Maybe it's just me, but it seems clear that a great many people think they are thinking when they are merely rearranging their prejudices. Consider this: Immigration has always been a problem in the United States. Ask any Native American.

Sad to say, but life always has been, is, and always will be a crap shoot. The greatest single variable is the person throwing the dice. On the other hand, if at first you don't succeed, find out if the loser gets anything. We all know that success is not guaranteed and, if achieved, it isn't necessarily permanent. Nor is there anything fatal about a failure. It depends on that all important variable, the person throwing the dice.

What all this has to do with poetry, I'm not sure. Perhaps my anxieties and concerns will find their ways into poems, or perhaps a poem will help me to deal with them. Either way, I feel better having shared them, and that's what matters. May your own pandemic ponderings and random thoughts find their expression, whether in poetry or some other form, as we go forward through these uncertain, and anxious, times. Who knows, you may reach a sympathetic ear. Cheers!
